2013 WVMTA CONFERENCE SCHEDULE

The 2013 West Virginia Music Teachers Association Convention will be held November 14-16 at the College of Creative Arts, West Virginia University in Morgantown, WV. All events will take place within the Creative Arts Center.

This year's theme is "Sessions with Nelita True". Dr. True will present two seminars, a masterclass, and one of her former Eastman students, Dr. Sergio Monteiro, will present the featured concert on Friday evening.

The convention will begin Thursday evening, November 14, at 5:00 PM with the District Chairs and Board Meeting at Ali Baba's Restaurant. Ali Baba's features Middle Eastern cuisine along with American fare. The restaurant is located at 110 Hart Field Road at the Morgantown Municipal Airport. It is most easily accessed via the Airport Road exit from Interstate 68.

Dr. John Beall and friends will present a concert of Dr. Beall's compositions at 8:00 p.m. in Bloch Hall of the Creative Arts Center. Dr. Beall is a long time WVMTA member and Commissioned Composer. His program will feature new compositions along with selected favorites. Plan to attend a reception for Dr. Beall following his program in the CAC lobby.

Friday morning will open with Sheila Barnhart and Justin Krueger presenting "Technology Tricks, Tips and Tools for the 21st Century Studio Teacher," in Room 440 at 9:00 a.m. Websites, video editing, and using YouTube will be some of the featured topics.

At 10:15 a.m., Dr. Nelita True will present the workshop "Teaching: What's REALLY Important" in the Falbo Theater. Following Dr. True's session, it will be lunch on your own.

The afternoon sessions begin at 1:00 p.m. with conference clinician, Dr. Joanne Haroutounian presenting:, "4th Finger on B-flat: Effective Strategies for Teaching Piano," in Room 424. At 2:15 p.m., Ms. True will present the seminar "Don't Play in Time" in the Falbo Theater. The final session of the day will be at 3:30 in Room 440 where Lisa Levinson will discuss aspects of the Alexander Technique.

The General Membership Meeting will be held Friday at 5:00 p.m. in the Blaney Seminar Room.

The WVMTA Banquet will be held on Friday, November 15, at 6:00 p.m., at the Terra Cafe, 425 Industrial Avenue in Star City. 
From 68 West

CAMPUS MAPS




HOTELS

GUEST ARTISTS AND CLINICIANS

Featured Conference Clinician: Dr. Nelita True

Since Nelita True made her debut at age seventeen with the Chicago Symphony in Orchestra Hall and her New York debut with the Juilliard Orchestra in Avery Fisher Hall, her career has taken her to the major cities of Western and Eastern Europe, Indonesia, Korea, Japan, Mexico, Iceland, New Zealand, Brazil, Australia, Canada, India, and to Hong Kong and Singapore, as well as to all fifty states in America. She was a visiting professor at the St. Petersburg Conservatory in Russia, performing and conducting master classes and has been in the People's Republic of China more than 20 times for recitals, concerto performances, and master classes.

Ms. True has been described in *Clavier Companion* as "One of the world's most sought-after and beloved pianist-teachers." Her students have won top prizes in national and international competitions, and many of her former students now serve on the faculties of major schools around the



country. Formerly Distinguished Professor at the University of Maryland, Ms. True is currently Professor of Music at the Eastman School of Music. She was awarded the Certificate of Merit by the Alumni Association of the University of Michigan, the Eisenhart Award for Excellence in Teaching at Eastman, the 2002 Achievement Award from the Music Teachers' National Association, the Lifetime Achievement Award in Graduate Education from the University of Rochester, and a Lifetime Achievement Award from the National Keyboard Pedagogy Conference (USA).


Ms. True has been a jury member for the Dublin International Piano Competition, China International Piano Competition (Beijing), the Queen Sonja International Piano Competition (Oslo), the National Piano Competition in Brazil, the Horowitz Competition (Kiev), the Concours de Musique in Canada, the PTNA (Tokyo), the Lev Vlassenko Competition in Australia, and the Gina Bachauer, New Orleans, Hilton Head, and William Kapell International Piano Competitions in the U.S.

A Phi Beta Kappa graduate of the University of Michigan as a student of Helen Titus, Ms. True went on to Juilliard to study with Sascha Gorodnitzki, and then earned the DMA with Leon Fleisher at the Peabody Conservatory. In Paris, she studied with Nadia Boulanger on a Fulbright grant.

S and H Productions of Kansas City produced a series of four videotapes, "Nelita True at Eastman," featuring her performances, lectures, and teaching. These videos are currently being seen on five continents. She has been featured in articles in *Clavier, Piano Today, The European Piano Teachers' Journal*, and is the subject of cover stories in *Keyboard Companion* and *Clavier Companion*.

Featured Conference Composer and Artist, Thursday evening, November 14, 2013: Dr. John Beall

John Beall, Professor and Composer-in-Residence at West Virginia University since 1978, is a native Texan. The son of a Baptist minister, he grew up in Belton and Beaumont, and obtained his first degrees from Baylor University, a leading church-related institution. In those years Beall absorbed a deep classical musical culture; before college, he had become a capable pianist and string player, both double bass and cello, with a precocious knowledge of their literature. After serving four years in the United States Air Force, he attended the Eastman School of Music for his doctorate (Ph.D, 1973), obtaining the Louis Lane Prize and the Howard Hanson Prize, two of Eastman's highest composition honors. His principal teachers were Samuel Adler at Eastman, and Richard Willis and Charles Eakin at Baylor.



Beall's first academic positions were in Texas and Illinois, before he accepted the West Virginia position. In the succeeding years, even after his relocation to West Virginia, several of Beall's outstanding works, such as the Piano Fantasy and the Anglican Mass, continued to utilize serial materials and techniques; but there was a definite trend toward a more tonally-centered, yet still highly individualized harmonic and melodic syntax. Hymn and folk material, and the drive to communicate their emotional essence, played a large role in this transition. But an unmistakably Appalachian orientation is felt as early as 1981, in the quartet for piano, violin, cello, and clarinet On Chestnut Ridge. On Chestnut Ridge utilized Fair Charlotte and Lover's Lament from Patrick Gainer's book, Folksongs from the West Virginia Hills. His 1997 opera, Ethan Frome, written in collaboration with librettist Jack Held, quotes the New England

fiddle tune, Soldier's Joy. At the same time Beall was becoming more deeply acquainted with the scenic wonders of his adopted state, its mountains, gorges, and whitewater, as well as its people. Often his chosen hymn tunes have a strong flavor of folk music. In his Sonata for Cello and Piano, 1984, he used the tune Softly and Tenderly Jesus is Calling. His Symphony No. 1 in 1985 used the hymn Dunlap's Creek; and the orchestral Mountain Music, 1987, used Am I a Soldier of the Cross, as well as Beall's original version of a barn-dance fiddle tune. His Symphony No. 2, "Spruce Knob," (2003) is named for the highest peak in West Virginia and uses the folk song, Come All You Fair and Tender Ladies as its signature melody. Folk tunes have also figured in more recent works such as the Sonata for Viola and Piano (2004) and the Piano Quintet (2008). The hymn tune Come, Holy Ghost is used in the recent band piece, Righteous Fire.

His music is published by Carl Fischer, and Southern Music Co. and also available through Theodore Front Musical Literature, Inc. Recordings of his music are found on Crystal Records (one LP) and Cambria (2 CDs), E.R.M. Media (2 CDs), and the West Virginia University Press (2 CDs).

Featured Conference Clinician: Dr. Joanne Haroutounian

Joanne Haroutounian serves on the George Mason University piano faculty, and oversees the



University's piano pedagogy program. Dr. Haroutounian combines her musical careers in performance, teaching, writing, editing and pedagogy with research in educational psychology and gifted/arts education. She presents workshops and master-classes internationally, regularly presenting at national conferences of MTNA and Pedagogy Conferences. She was the keynote presenter at the Singapore International Piano Pedagogy Seminar in June 2009.

She is well known for editing and writing numerous teaching publications offered through Kjos Music Co., including her newly-released pedagogy text, *Fourth Finger on B-Flat: Effective Strategies for Teaching Piano*. She compiled and edited *Chamber Music Sampler*, a set of three books of piano trios for intermediate to moderately advanced performers. She also developed *Explorations*

in Music, a comprehensive curriculum in theory, ear training, analysis, and creative composition. The series has been described as the "favorite teaching material published in 1993" (Piano and Keyboard)," fascinating for students, a significant contribution to available theory materials" (Clavier), and a "landmark text that will enrich the learning process in the studio of any teacher who uses it" (American Music Teacher). The publication, Kindling the Spark: Recognizing and Developing Musical Talent, offered through Oxford University Press, provides information regarding perspectives of musical talent for teachers, parents, and pedagogy or music education students in college.

Dr. Haroutounian's specialized interest in working with talented music students grew into research that led to the development of the MusicLink program, which provides long-term private instruction to promising students in financial need. She is currently the Director of the MusicLink Foundation, a non-profit organization that has reached over 5,000 students in forty states and four Canadian provinces, providing 300,000 hours of instruction, equivalent to almost \$8 million in scholarship donation provided by volunteer MusicLink teachers. Joanne Haroutounian Conference Session Fourth Finger on B Flat: Effective Strategies for Teaching Piano

This text grew from sharing ideas with teachers across the country, so it is practical, user-friendly, and offers some unique strategies you can try in your studios. Are you seeking a better way to assess student capabilities during the initial interview? It is in there. Do you wish your students would have more input and interest in making decisions about interpretation of pieces? It is in there. What about some unique ways to develop practice routines that mirror ideas of deliberate practice, so prevalent in research and article? Want to get a bit more creative with your students? Studio business ideas are always welcome, whether you are a fresh teacher or an experienced teacher seeking fresh ideas to try. Let's share all that is "in there" together. The session will present a general overview of this new pedagogy text and focus on these ideas and more – including a comprehensive way to teach scales and technique, from beginning pentachords to multiple octavescales and arpeggios.

Featured Conference Clinician: Lisa Levinson



Lisa Levinson is an AmSAT-certified teacher of the Alexander Technique, and is also certified as a Registered Movement Therapist. Based in Pittsburgh, PA, Lisa has a lively private practice, and presents classes and workshops throughout the tristate area. In addition, she teaches the Alexander Technique at Carnegie Mellon University's School of Drama, School of Music, and at the UPMC Center for Integrative Medicine. During the summers, she has been part of the teaching faculty at the annual Dalcroze Eurhythmics workshops at Carnegie Mellon, the Summer Choral Workshops at Youngstown State University, and the Dobama Emerging Actors Program in Cleveland, OH. She has presented the Alexander Technique to groups ranging from the Mendelssohn Choir of Pittsburgh to the American Mensa Annual Gathering. Lisa has extensive experience working with

musicians, actors, and people with pain issues, and has a special interest in exploring the relationship between breath, movement, and sound.



Sheila Barnhart is currently a DMA candidate at West Virginia University studying Piano Performance with Dr. Christine Kefferstan, and serves as the Graduate Assistant Piano Technician. She earned an MM from WVU and a BM from Westminster College where she studied with Dr. Nancy Zipay-DeSalvo. Her article Engaging, Accessible and Fresh: Ferruccio Busoni's Two-Piano Transcriptions of Works by Mozart was published in the September 2011 issue of the MTNA E-Journal, a collaborative effort with Dr. Kefferstan.

Awarded the 2010 WVU Graduate Enrichment Fellowship, Barnhart is an active member of the WVU collegiate chapter of the Music Teachers National Association, and teaches in the WVU Community Music Program. She was a 2010 winner of the Young Artist concerto competition at WVU, and has performed for numerous master classes, including performances for Dr. Laura Melton of Bowling Green State University and French-Italian pianist Olivier Cavé. Barnhart has also performed as an invited Guest Artist for the Steinway Society of Western Pennslvania's lunchtime concert series, and at Westminster College.

Justin Krueger NCTM is a DMA student at West Virginia University studying piano with Dr.



Peter Amstutz. He previously earned an MM in Piano Pedagogy studying with Dr. Sylvia Coats and piano with Dr. Andrew Trechak at Wichita State University, where he was also a graduate teaching assistant. He has won several accolades for his performance and his teaching, and is also active in the MTNA organization where he holds National Certification.

FEATURED CONFERENCE ARTIST: Dr. Sergio Monteiro



Internationally-acclaimed pianist Sergio Monteiro will present the WVMTA Convention's Friday night Recital. A native of Brazil, Dr. Monteiro has given critically acclaimed concerts throughout Europe, North America, and South America. Dr. Monteiro achieved fame by winning the second annual Martha Argerich Piano Competition in 2003. Ms. Argerich proclaims that Dr. Monteiro is "an artist with extraordinary creativity and energy."

Awarded a scholarship to study in America, Sergio Monteiro earned his Doctorate of Musical Arts from the Eastman School of Music where he studied with our featured clinician, Nelita True. While at Eastman, Dr.

Monteiro earned numerous accolades while earning the Performance Certificate and winning the Concerto Competition.

Dr. Monteiro has appeared with every important Brazilian orchestra, as well as orchestras throughout Europe. An energetic champion of Brazilian music, Sergio Monteiro has been honored by many composers with invitations to give premieres of original compositions dedicated to him. In 2008, he recorded a CD of the complete cycle of Villa-Lobos' "Prolo do Bebe".

Currently, Mr. Monteiro is the head of the piano program at the Wanda L. Bass School of Music at Oklahoma City University. Mr. Monteiro's program will feature Villa-Lobos' "Prolo de Bebe" No. 2, Book 1 of Albeniz's "Iberia Suite" and works by Mendelssohn and Schumann.

IMPORTANT ANNOUNCEMENT: VOTE TO CHANGE BYLAWS

MTNA was under investigation by the FTC to determine if the clause in their Code of Ethics: "The teacher shall respect the integrity of other teachers' studios and shall not actively recruit students from another studio," unlawfully restrains competition among music teachers. In response to this investigation, MTNA has changed the wording of their Code. The new wording appears on their website, under "Commitment to Colleagues". Please visit http://www.mtna.org/about-mtna/code-of-ethics/.

MTNA suggests that the bylaws of each state organization strongly encourage voluntary compliance with MTNA's updated Code of Ethics. Currently, WVMTA's bylaws state: "Acceptance of membership includes an agreement to abide by the Code of Ethics of the Association" (found under Article 1 – MEMBERSHIP, Section 1). Thus, WVMTA will be voting on the following changed wording at our General Membership Meeting, Friday, November 15, 2013, at 5:30 p.m.:

WVMTA strongly encourages its members to abide by the MTNA Code of Ethics.

Please make every effort to attend this meeting so that we can vote on the change to our bylaws.

Each mentor had a very personal approach to my training, but each focused on the greatness of the music and the imprint it made on their lives. My undergraduate degree is from Illinois Wesleyan, and my MM and DMA degrees are from the Cincinnati Conservatory. Both schools promote an education that fosters artistry as well as a thorough understanding and appreciation of history, theory, and the foundations of Western Art Music.

As a professor at WVU since 1979 (!), I have had the great joy of working with students from many countries and of varied backgrounds, from pre-school to doctorate level. Each student comes with the expectation that I will help them. Teaching has been the stimulus for my own growth, searching to find the best way to communicate not only musical knowledge but life skills as well. Former students are now teaching music and humanities courses in colleges, private lessons in studios, and performing with major and less-known ensembles throughout the US and Asia. This summer I will visit many of my former students in Malaysia and Indonesia as my daughter and I perform 6 concerts of music for two pianos. I cannot believe my good fortune! No matter how much terrain you cover, there is far more to explore. If you have ever climbed a mountain, you know that reaching the summit feels good; but once you take in the unlimited view, you become aware of how much more there is to experience.

About three decades ago, John Hawkins asked me to organize a summer WVMTA conference. How smart I was to say yes! That introduction to the members of our state led to many more connections as I eventually served as state president, Eastern Division president, and board member for the Foundation and for the national organization of MTNA. Over the years, it became evident to me that this is a well-governed, caring, and thoroughly professional teaching community. My students have had opportunities that contributed in the most positive ways to their maturing musicianship and sense of self-worth. Auditions, competitions, conference presentations, published articles, student chapter organizations, trips to conferences, rubbing elbows with guest artists, and enjoying concerts together are but a few of the benefits that my students and I have shared through MTNA. There is no doubt in my mind that I am a better teacher for having participated in many aspects of MTNA membership.

Notes from Arts Advocacy and Awareness Chair, Ruth Raubertas

Music in the Medical World by Ruth Raubertas

Healing with the use of music is an ancient art that has fallen into disuse in our specialized and compartmentalized medical world. There are signs, however, that music, along with other alternative healing modalities, is coming back into use by medical doctors and institutions. Music as a healing art can be traced back to Egypt and to Pythagoras, the Greek mathematician who developed the modern scale and attributed specific emotional states to the various modes. Most of us are also familiar with the story of David, from the Old Testament, who plays the harp for King Saul to calm Saul's fear and depression. Another story from the 1960s is told by the French physician Albert Tomatis who was called in by a monastery to diagnose a strange affliction of the monks who were exhibiting extreme listlessness and depressed moods. Tomatis discovered that, until a recent change in administration, the monks had been singing Gregorian chant several hours a day. Once the singing was re-instituted, the monks returned to health. In his 1999 book The Healing Power of Sound: Recovery from Life Threatening Illness Using Sound, Voice and Music, oncologist Mitchell Gaynor reported marked improvements among his patients who were treated with music or sound therapies in addition to standard cancer treatments. He cited numerous studies that provided evidence of healing. Studies of patients with recent heart attacks who listened to "relaxing music" showed reduced anxiety, heart and respiratory rates as well as fewer complications. Other studies show reduced blood pressure, heart rate, and noise sensitivity in heart surgery patients. (Too much noise, on the other hand, can increase blood pressure.) Studies of immune system functions showed similar improvements. According to Dr. Raymond Bahr of Baltimore's St. Agnes Hospital, "Half an hour of music produced the same effect as ten milligrams of valium."

Music Therapy as a profession had its beginnings after World War I when musicians began playing in clinical environments. The American Music Therapy Association, a merging of two groups, was formed in the late 1990s. Around the same time the related field of "therapeutic music" gained interest and various training programs arose. (These programs are largely, though not exclusively, geared toward certain instruments such as harp, guitar, flute and voice.) According to the National Standards Board for Therapeutic Musicians, founded in 2003, "The practice of the therapeutic musician is to use the intrinsic healing elements of live music and sound to provide an environment conducive to the human healing process." Some goals of the therapeutic musician are to:

- Augment pain management of the terminally ill
- Relieve anxiety of the chronically ill
- Accelerate physical healing of postsurgery and injured patients
- Ease the delivery process of the birthing mother
- Facilitate the transition process of the dying
- Reduce stress and blood pressure of the chronically ill
- Relieve body and mental tension of pre-operative patients.

The point of all this for us as music teachers is to think outside of our "box." If nothing else, we

need to impress upon ourselves and our students that the uses of music go way beyond entertainment and "performance." If we can consider the idea of music as a service to others, in which the focus is not on the musician but rather on the listener as someone in need, perhaps some of the performance anxiety of our students could be eliminated. There's nothing like the presence of a person in pain or even one close to death to humble us and help us remember that we are just conduits for the gift of music to others.
