- ➤ Has held membership in WVMTA for at least five (5) years.

The nominating committee is pleased to announce **Ian Jessee** as recipient of the 2021 WVMTA Teacher of the Year Award. Ian has served as WVMTA 1st vice president and competitions chair. He is a professional

violinist, award-winning music educator, administrator, and, since summer 2021, the newly appointed Executive Director and CEO of the Huntington Symphony Orchestra. He maintains an active private violin studio and serves as the conductor for the West Virginia Youth Symphony's (WVYS) middle-tier ensemble, Youth Strings. He formed the Cadet Strings, the youngest string orchestra ensemble tailored for beginner students within the WVYS after cultivating a robust Elementary School Strings Program throughout Kanawha County in Charleston, West Virginia through the West Virginia Symphony Orchestra and Kanawha County Board of Education joint String Education Program. He received his formal training in violin performance at The Ohio State University. We are grateful for Ian Jessee's abundant involvement in string education in the State of West Virginia and congratulate him to this well-deserved award!

Eastern Panhandle MTA/District VI Report:

During the meeting last month, we voted approve to set aside \$300 (Dr. Beard memorial scholarship) on a continuing budgetary basis for student with financial needs and collegiate scholarships to cover tuition and membership fees. Member teachers must submit a nomination for student scholarships to Dr. Liao no later than the end of August.
