

Barbara Nissman will be giving a lecture, masterclass and performing an exciting recital program for the WVMTA Conference.

In her evening recital on Friday, October 28th, Barbara will celebrate the 100th birthday of the Argentine composer Alberto Ginastera, who wrote his last work for Barbara and also pay tribute to Sergei Prokofiev who celebrates his 125th birthday this year, Bela Bartok who marks his 135th and also honor the "godfather" of all these composers, Franz Liszt who celebrates his 205th birthday in October. And let's not forget Franz Schubert who inspired the great Franz Liszt with his "Wanderer" Fantasy. A special birthday concert performed and introduced by Barbara pays homage to these great composers of the keyboard.

A Master Class with Barbara Nissman:

"First of all, I enjoy giving master classes. The exchange of ideas, the give and take that occurs between students as well as the observing public, and the challenge of trying to bring out the best that each individual can offer is exciting! To hear an interpretation develop, ripen, and focus becomes a magical experience for both the student and the teacher. A fresh outlook, another point of view, and a new way of solving problems provide learning tools for everyone, myself included. "

Lecture by Barbara Nissman: Barbara discusses the first program in her new Dvd master class series and shows excerpts from *Franz Liszt: Portrait of the Man and his Masterwork, the Sonata in B minor-* A Dvd Master Class with Barbara Nissman with Michael York as the voice of Franz Liszt.

Nissman's international career was personally launched by Eugene Ormandy, who had previously engaged her as soloist with the Philadelphia Orchestra. She has performed with the leading orchestras of Europe and America including the London Philharmonic, the Royal Philharmonic, the BBC Symphony, the Rotterdam Philharmonic and the Munich Philharmonic; in the US she has appeared with the New York Philharmonic, the Pittsburgh Symphony, the St. Louis Symphony, the Philadelphia Orchestra, the Chicago Symphony, the National Symphony and the Cleveland Orchestra among others. She has worked with some of the major conductors of our time including Eugene Ormandy, Riccardo Muti, Stanislaw Skrowaczewski and Leonard Slatkin.

Nissman made history in 1989 by becoming the first pianist to perform the complete piano sonatas of Sergei Prokofiev in a series of three recitals in both New York and London. Her recordings of this repertoire represented the first complete set of Prokofiev Sonatas made available on compact disc. BBC Music Magazine in their recent cover story on Prokofiev recommended Nissman's recordings as the best recordings of Prokofiev's piano music.

A recording devoted to the music of Béla Bartók features the first performance of his unpublished 1898 Sonata. Scarecrow Press has published Ms. Nissman's book, *Bartók and the Piano: A Performer's View*, which includes a CD insert of Bartók's music performed by the author.

Ms. Nissman has long been associated with the music of Argentine composer, Alberto Ginastera, and is the dedicatee of the composer's final work, the Sonata No. 3. Recently, she was invited by the BBC to co-host a five-part radio series featuring Ginastera as composer-of-the-week on Radio 3. Her recording of all three piano concertos has just been released and features the first recording of his Concierto Argentino as well as the first recording of the original score of his Piano Concerto No.2. She will be celebrating his 100th anniversary this year with performances and lectures devoted to his music in the US and the UK.

Barbara Nissman recently appeared on stage with Don Henley of the Eagles and Billy Joel, performing on the "Walden Steinway" in a gala fundraiser for the Walden Woods project, held at Jazz at Lincoln Center. She was also one of the participants with Leonard Slatkin at the Kennedy Center's 25th Anniversary Gala Concert that was broadcast on PBS Television. She has also been involved with the Robert James Frascino AIDS Foundation benefit concert series, "A Concerted Effort" since 2002. To date these concerts have raised well over two million dollars for AIDS service organizations worldwide.

Performer, writer, lecturer, and frequent guest artist/clinician, Barbara Nissman has toured and given master classes throughout the United States, Europe, the Far East, New Zealand, and South America. At the invitation of both the Moscow and St. Petersburg Conservatories, she presented recitals and master classes on Prokofiev. Barbara Nissman received her bachelor's, master's and doctoral degrees from the University of Michigan. Born and raised in Philadelphia, she now calls West Virginia home and lives on a farm in Greenbrier Country. In 2008, she was the recipient of the Governor's Arts Award.

Conference Clinicians:

Three's Company-Engaging Piano Trios for the Studio and Concert Stage

An overview of original works and transcriptions written for piano, six-hands. Also included are pedagogical works written for intermediate students, as and special considerations when practicing and preparing works for piano, six-hands.

Keyboard trios (music for six hands at one piano) have been a unique part of piano ensemble repertoire since the development of the piano. It was in the early 19th century—with the continued development of larger pianos—that compositions for six hands at one keyboard began to appear in the form of both original compositions and arrangements/transcriptions of popular works.

As with piano duets, teachers often composed six-hand pieces for their pupils. This workshop will includes some of the earliest composers of six-hand music: Wilhelm Friedrich Ernst Bach (1759-1845), Carolus Antonius Fodor (1768-1846) and Cornelius Gurlitt (1820-1901).

In the 19th century, *salon* works for six hands gained in popularity, and by the early 20th century, the educational value of this ensemble became widely recognized by teachers, pedagogical composers and publishers alike. Many compositions from this period carry subtitles such as "The Three Sisters" or "The Three Amateurs," reflecting ensemble playing in the home with friends and family. A great example of this is the set of two pieces (Romance and Valse) by Rachmaninoff, written for his cousins, the Skalon sisters.

Included in the workshop will be an overview of works written for late advanced and early intermediate students by composers such as Alexander Peskanov, Melody Bober and Catherine Rollin. The workshop will also include special considerations when practicing and preparing works for piano six hands.



Dr. Scott Beard


Dr. Scott Beard has nearly twenty years experience in higher education, both in the field of music and in administration. A full professor in the Department of Music, he was Coordinator of Keyboard Studies from 1998-2011. In his position as Associate Vice President for Academic Affairs and Dean of Graduate Studies & Continuing Education, his responsibilities include: oversight of all graduate programs and academic policies and oversight of institutional and programmatic accreditation. Responsibilities also include writing regular and special reports to the West Virginia Higher Education Policy Commission, cyclical program reviews, development of new degree program proposals and representing academic affairs on committees such as strategic planning, student success, commencement and diversity and equity.

Recognized for his outstanding teaching abilities, Dr. Beard was named 2006 West Virginia Music Teacher of the Year and was runner-up for West Virginia Professor of the Year in 2009. His students have won prizes in state, regional, national and international competitions, and have gone on to study music at conservatories and major university music schools.

Concerts as a soloist, chamber musician and orchestral soloist have taken him throughout the United States and Canada, Croatia, Ecuador, France, Italy, and Spain. Recital appearances include Weill Recital Hall, the Tenri Cultural Institute (NYC), the Polish, Danish, Belgian, and Russian Embassies, and numerous universities throughout the East Coast. His concerts have been praised for their poetry, passion and innovative programming. Beard has published articles in several national publications and his anthologies of piano ensemble music (with Dr. Lucy Mauro) are published by Alfred.

Dr. Beard is an active member of Music Teachers National Association (MTNA) and is a former national board member, having served as Director of the Eastern Division (13-state region) of MTNA.

Yu-Hsuan Liao

A native of Taipei, Taiwan, Yu-Hsuan received her Masters and Doctoral Degrees of Musical Arts in Piano Performance from University of Texas at Austin under Danielle Martin, Dariusz Pawlas, and Gregory Allen. She began her musical studies in Tung-Hai University under Thomas Linde, receiving her Bachelor of Fine Arts degree. She is a piano soloist, collaborative artist, and music educator.

She has expanded her repertoire in instrumental, chamber, vocal and choral music in various styles and periods. Yu-Hsuan worked with "American Repertory Ensemble" and performed piano solo, chamber and accompanying vocal music in the company's performance series. Her solo performance with A.R.E. ("Valses Poéticos", Passion at Play) was nominated for best instrumentalist in the Austin Critics Table Award for season of 2008-2009. She gave a piano lecture-recital based on her published book (2009) titled "Manuel de Falla's Cuatro Piezas Españoles: Combinations and Transformations of the Spanish Folk Modes" and a solo piano performance in composers' new composition concert at the College Music Society conferences.

Yu-Hsuan has joined the faculty at Shepherd University since the fall semester of 2011. She is an active member of the West Virginia Music Teachers Association, and has been granted the National Certification for Teacher of Music (NCTM) by Music Teachers National Association (MTNA). She is the district chair of Eastern Panhandle Music Teachers Association and WVMTA state collaborative performance chair. She regularly gives master classes and is in high demand for adjudication at festivals and competitions around the West Virginia, Maryland, Virginia, and D.C. region.



Dr. Laura Renninger

Dr. Laura Renninger is the Dean of Teaching, Learning and Instructional Resources at Shepherd. Her office oversees several university programs including Academic Support, Academic Advising, Assessment, Audio-Visual Media Services, Career Development and Co-op, First-Year Experience and Common Reading, Instructional Technology and TRiO Student Support Services. Dr. Renninger is directly in charge of faculty training and workshops. She is also Professor of Music and teaches courses in Music Psychology, World Music, and Western Music History at Shepherd University. She received her Bachelor's of Music degree in Performance from Miami University and both her Master's of Music and Ph.D. degrees in Musicology from the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign.

Dr. Renninger's research is concentrated primarily in the area of Music Cognition. Her research is internationally known and has been presented at several conferences throughout the United States, Europe, Asia, the Middle East and Oceana. In the summer of 1998, her work was chosen as one of the best new research studies at the Fifth International Conference on Music Perception and Cognition held in Seoul, Korea, and was published in the fall of 1999 in the book Music, Mind and Science. Dr. Renninger's recent research has been published in the leading music psychology journal, Music Perception.

In addition to her scholarship, Dr. Renninger is an accomplished musician who has had a diverse range of musical experiences and has won several awards including the Toledo Ohio Young Artist Award. She has performed numerous times as a soloist with the Toledo Symphony Orchestra and has worked for several years as a rehearsal accompanist, chamber musician and church organist. She currently serves as the accompanist for the Shepherd Three wind trio. She truly enjoys teaching and is very committed to broadening student horizons in the field of music. In her free time she enjoys cooking, scuba diving and biking. She resides in Shepherdstown with her husband, son, and two daughters.

I Hear America Singing: A Recital of American Poetry

Baritones Robert Tudor and Bobb Robinson join celebrated collaborative pianist Yu-Hsuan Liao for an exploration of American poetry set to music. The recital will include, among others, the poetic works of Walt Whitman and Christy MacKaye Barnes, the music of noted historic composers Phillip Dalmas and Ralph Vaughan Williams, and contemporary composers James Jenkins and Walker Williams.

Bobb Robinson, baritone, has been praised by *The Washington Post* for his "charismatic stage presence" and "rich, flowing" voice, and by *The Miami Herald* for his "impressively effortless" singing. A former resident of Washington, DC, Bobb has performed for three Presidents, and appeared at some of the nation's most prominent venues, including the Kennedy Center, Washington National Cathedral, and the White House.

A 2001 Regional Finalist in the Metropolitan Opera National Council Auditions, Bobb has performed over 20 operatic roles, including Friedrick Wieck, father of Clara Schumann, in the World Premier of Robert Convery's opera "Clara". An innovative collaborator, Bobb conceived "Twentyfour: Italian Songs and Arias for a New Century", a narrative presentation of 17th-and 18th-Century Italian song for voice and percussion ensemble. Bobb also recently co-wrote and performed an original cabaret, *Une soireé à l'Olympia*, presented as part of "Paris on the Potomac", Washington DC's year-long celebration of French Art and Culture. Other cabaret appearances include *Noel and Cole* and *A Tale of Two Cities: Paris and Berlin Between the Wars* at Maryland's Clarice Smith Performing Arts Center.

As concert soloist, Bobb regularly performs with renowned ensembles including the Washington Bach Consort, The Denver Bach Society, The Montana Early Music Festival, and The National Gallery of Art Vocal Ensemble. European recital performances include The Alba Music Festival (Italy) and Festival d'Avignon (France).

Bobb has been a featured performer on recordings with the Choirs of Washington National Cathedral, as well as the recent Clear Note Records release of Brahms vocal chamber music, *Liebestreu*.

Recent stage works Bobb has directed include Mozart's *Cosi fan tutte* and *La Clemenza di Tito*, Michael Ching's *Buoso's Ghost* (a sequel to Puccini's *Gianni Schicchi*), and a rare modern performance of Marschner's *Der Vampyr*. Bobb is currently a Visiting Assistant Professor of Voice and Opera at Ohio University, and has previously taught at Jacksonville University (FL), The University of North Carolina (Chapel Hill), and Frostburg State University (MD), as well as Shepherd University.

Baritone **Robert Tudor** enjoys a vibrant career in the genres of opera, early music, musical theater and cabaret, and as a concert soloist throughout the United States. His professional work with early music began with the celebrated Washington Bach Consort under the direction of J. Reilly Lewis where he was featured soloist in J. S. Bach's cantatas *Schau, lieber Gott, wie meine Fiend* and *Höchsterwünschtes Freudenfest*, as well as John Taverner's "God is with us." Other national concert engagements have included *Utrecht Jubilate* and *Dettingem Te Deum* by G. F. Handel, the *Requiems* of Fauré and Duruflé, and Bach's *Weihnachts-Oratorium* and *Hohe Messe*, Haydn's *The Creation*, and Berlioz's *L'Enfance du Christ*.

Since 2007, Robert has been featured annually as guest artist in the Montana Early Music Festival. Concert works as soloist included Franceso Cavalli's *Venetian Vespers*, Andrea and Giovanni Gabrieli's *Venetian Coronation – 1595, Canticum Trium Puerorum* by Michael Praetorius, *Musikalisches Exequien* by Heinrich Schütz, Handel's *Israel in Egypt*, Scarlatti's *Stabat Mater*, and *Johannes-Passion* by J.S. Bach. He also returns to Montana each summer as an artist and instructor at the Helena Choral Festival, where he directs, teaches and appears as soloist in recitals and concerts.

Robert's performance as bass soloist in Bach's *Christmas Oratorio* in 2011 with Pro Musica Colorado Chamber Orchestra garnered praise as a "solid and resonant" performer by the Boulder Daily Camera in a concert hailed as "Yet another world-class performance!" in OpusColorado. Other artist engagements have included soloist with the Jacksonville Symphony Orchestra and the Maryland Symphony Orchestra. Robert is an active stage performer with credits in opera and music theater that range from *La Boheme* to *The Titanic*. His performance as the Second Elder in a staged version of Handel's *Susannah* with the Maryland Handel Festival grabbed the attention of The Washington Post, where he was described as having a "powerful singing voice" and "notable acting skills". In 2012, Robert was honored to appear a guest artist at *The Art of Argento* – a two-week celebration of the music of contemporary American composer Dominick Argento at the University of Maryland. During his residency at the festival, he performed Argento's powerful solo work for baritone *The Andree Expedition* and the mono-dramatic opera *A WaterBird Talk*.

Robert received a Doctorate in Musical Arts in Voice Performance from the University of Maryland. He serves as Director of Vocal Activities and Chair of the Department of Music at Shepherd University. Awards include an Individual Artist Award from the Maryland State Arts Council and Artist of the Year from Opera Theatre of Northern Virginia.



Dr. Ruta Smedina-Starke will be presenting "The Phenomenon of Russian Pianism and Russian Piano Technique.

The lecture-workshop focuses on the beginnings and history of the Russian Pianism, as well as Russian pianist genealogy which includes discussion of the Russian pianist genealogy charts. There is an in depth discussion of the greatest Russian pedagogues: N. Zverev, H. Neuhaus, A. Goldenweiser, K. Igumnov and their main teaching principles.

A great portion of the lecture - workshop is devoted to discussion and demonstration of H. Neuhaus's *Eight Elements of Technique* with audience participation.

In conclusion of the Lecture-Workshop there is a discussion of the Piano Repertoire, specifically etudes that are recommended by Russian pedagogues for development of piano technique, with a focus on piano etudes by lesser known Russian composers: A. Arenski, F. Blumenfeld and A. Glazunov, as well as the world renowned Russian-contemporary composer N. Kapustin

Ruta Smedina-Starke was born in Latvia and began playing the piano at the age of five and later studied the piano with Larisa Olshtinskaja at Yelgava City Music College. In 1988, she graduated from the University of Latvia in Riga with a Bachelor of Arts in English. She then moved to Richmond, VA, where she studied with Dr. Sonia Vlahcevic and graduated from Virginia Commonwealth University with a Master of Music in Piano Performance. She has studied privately with Dr. Dmitri Shteinberg.

Smedina-Starke is a member of Pi Kappa Lambda, the National Music Honor Society, She is a Nationally Certified Teacher of Music. She is also a member of RMTA (Richmond Music Teachers Association) and VMTA (Virginia Music Teachers Association). From 2006-2009 she served as a Chairman of RMTA Bach Competition. She has been selected to participate in master classes with international pianists Jon

Nakamatsu and Stephen Hough. During the 2006 Piano Texas International Academy and Festival, she participated in the master class with international pianists Harold Martina and Seymour Bernstein.

Smedina-Starke is the recipient of the Jordan Kitt's Music 2006 Educator Grant. Philosophy

MTNA is dedicated to encouraging the creation of new works by American composers and annually assists its affiliated State Associations with the generation and performance of new music through the national Composer Commissioning program. A newly commissioned work receives its premiere performance at the convention of the State MTA responsible for that commission.

To further promote and recognize outstanding contributions to American music, MTNA annually has its State Affiliates submit their commissioned works to a panel of recognized composers for selection of the MTNA Distinguished Composer of the Year.

The new work of the selected composer is presented in a concert performance at the next MTNA National Conference, and the composer is proclaimed the MTNA Distinguished Composer of the Year. The selected composer also receives a check for \$5,000.

Definition of a Commission

A commission is a formal, written agreement between two or more parties authorizing the performance of a certain task-that is, the act of entrusting, of placing confidence in someone to carry out a task that person has been authorized to do. In terms of the MTNA Composer Commissioning program, a commission is for the successful creation of a new musical work, for which the commissioning State MTA will pay a commission fee, including MTNA's matching funds up to \$750. A commission is not a prize for an extant composition; rather, it is meaningful encouragement for a recognized composer to create a new musical work after formal agreement is reached.

*Note: For West Virginia, the commission fee is \$500, with an additional matching \$500 from MTNA, for a total of \$1,000 for the commission.

General Considerations

MTNA makes no stipulations regarding composer choice, performance medium, composition length or compositional style. These decisions are left to each state association and its commissioned composer.

However, three practical considerations are worth noting:

• First, the new work by the selected MTNA Distinguished Composer of the Year is presented in a concert performance during the next MTNA National Conference. The total time allotted for this, including recognition of the composer and presentation of the award,

is twenty (20) minutes. When the length of the composition exceeds this amount of time, a representative portion of it may be presented.

- Second, the selected composer is responsible for providing the performer(s) for the presentation of the new work at the National Conference. MTNA provides no honorarium to defray expenses for this performance.
- Third, a composer entering a contractual agreement for commission of a new work will have his/her labeled score and CD deposited in the MTNA Archives at the University of Cincinnati Libraries and accepts the fact that the three anonymous scores and CDs will not be returned. This is intended to encourage other performances of a commissioned work by making the score available for study and interlibrary loan. In an effort to protect the rights of the composer, the staff at MTNA National Headquarters affixes this notice to the front of the score:

Awards

The State MTA pays the composer a commission fee. The total amount of the fee is at the discretion of the State MTA. MTNA will match the State MTA's contribution to a maximum of \$750, but in no case will MTNA's contribution exceed the state's portion.

Two or more state associations may jointly commission a composer. Up to \$750 per state will be matched equally by MTNA. Thus, at the maximum dollar-for-dollar match, two states could offer a combined commission fee of \$3,000; three states, \$4,500; etc. Additionally, states participating in a joint commission may augment these amounts at their discretion, but with no further contribution from MTNA.

2017 Siegel-Hoffmann Concerto Competition

Students from elementary school through college are eligible to participate in this event held in Shepherdstown, WV. Founded by Dr. Scott Beard, NTCM, the competition is named for Judith Siegel and Helen Hoffman, two teachers who stressed the importance of ensemble music, especially concerti.

Founded by Dr. Scott Beard, (NCTM), the competition is named for Judith Siegel and Helen Hoffmann, two of his former teachers who stressed the importance of ensemble music, especially concerti.

*Prizes: Junior: \$25 Intermediate: \$50 Senior: \$100/\$50

*Depending on funds, additional prizes or performance opportunities may be available.

Eligibility:

All students who study with a member of WVMTA are eligible to enter. The Junior category runs through8th grade; Intermediate through 10th grade and Senior through the college level for the competitive categories.

Audition Procedure:

For the competitive category, all selections must be memorized. One original copy of the music is sufficient. Music from internet sites (where noted in competition repertoire) is acceptable. Measures must be numbered at the beginning of each system. Evaluation areas: Interpretation and overall artistic effect. A winner in each category will be selected solely on the basis of the audition performance. The decision of the judges is final. Students must secure their own accompanist for the competition.

Non-competitive category:

Students may play a any concerto movement or movements. Students will receive comments from the judges and an overall rating. Students will receive performance points for this event. *Please note that there is an additional entry fee for each movement performed.*

Royal Conservatory Music Development Program

Morgantown will be offering national RCM-MDP Examinations this Fall-Winter. Performance exams in Morgantown will be held on December 3rd at the Creative Arts Center of West Virginia University. Written Theory Exams will be offered on Friday & Saturday, December 9th & 10th, again at the CAC.

The Royal Conservatory MDP is a comprehensive program (theory, technique, ear training, sight reading, studies, repertoire) that assesses and certifies student progress (for most all instruments) according to national standards. Trained examiners are sent to sites to evaluate student presentations. National headquarters has now opened the registration process for Fall-Winter exams. The LAST date to register without a late fee will be October 18th. All registration is done online by students/parents. There is very little that individual teachers are required to do except to continue the preparation that has hopefully already been in process anyway. And Teachers: there is no additional membership required, to any organizations, although you can register yourself through MDP (for free) to obtain a teacher- number and get access to results of students who register under you, and get access to numerous exclusive resources. You can access the online national exams site by googling music development program, or Royal Conservatory Music Development Program, or to get directly to the site: musicdevelopmentprogram.org. When students/parents register for the first time, they will need to create a log-in user-name/email & password. Remember this info for easy access for future exams. Each registrant will also need to have available: the teacher's permanent number (if applicable), or teacher phone number or teacher email address. Once registration is completed, each student then gets a permanent, forever, "student number". Either remind each student/parent to remember this number for easy access for future exams, or copy this number down in teacher files for future retrieval. The registration process itself is relatively easy...just a series of drop-down menu choices mostly.
